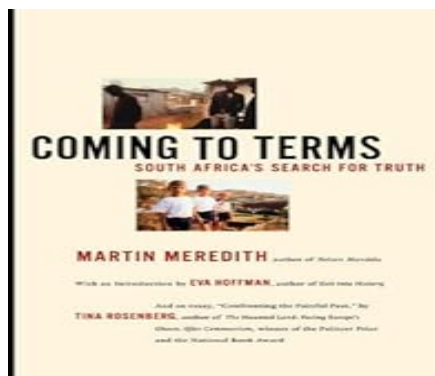

I came away with even more profound respect for the humanity and courage of Desmond Tutu than I had before which was considerable but was left with a feeling of ambivalence about the whole affair of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission which I hadn't expected. The authors' pragmatism does not sit well with the part of me that is much more comfortable with hard and fast moral judgments and what they point out again and again is how the kinds of atrocity perpetuated in South Africa dehumanize all parties involved and make emergence from such depths of depravity very difficult indeed. The temptation to simply change the players but continue the game is very great and the path to a better way is often difficult to find and necessarily different in different situations; i. I kept thinking throughout this book of the ongoing travesties in Congo Libya and elsewhere and the only glimmer of hope held out is the occasional moral giant like Mandela or Tutu and the hope that the international community will continue to be attracted to ideals like democratic participation in government the rule of law over force and the preference of the rights of the oppressed over the interests of the mighty.
