

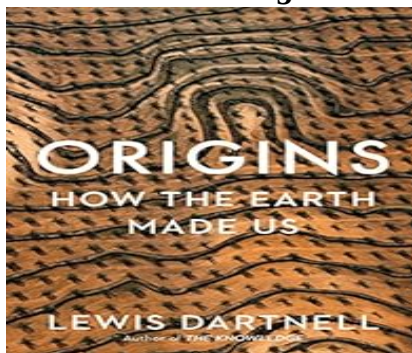

Lewis Dartnell is not a scientist and describes himself as a professor of science communication. **Caste the origins of our discontents pdf** The book is very well referenced and I think readers looking for information on our origins would do best to read the works of the palaeontologists archaeologists Dartnell overlooks major theoretical issues and conflicting empirical evidence in order to provide the reader with a single fuzzy unconvincing explanation for the evolution of our hominoid ancestors. **Origins book lewis dartnell** The aquatic ape theory has been largely ignored and dismissed by the patriarchs of evolutionary anthropology primarily because it wasn't developed by anthropologists and its major proponent is a woman and a feminist. **Origins mod** However it has remained quite popular outside the discipline because it offers a brilliant and cohesive account for the many differences between hominoids and other primates that remain unexplained by the dominant theory. **Origins book neil degrasse tyson** For example why are humans relatively hairless? Why are we the only apes with a porous bone structure that allows us to float & swim when other apes sink? Why are human babies born with a breath holding reflex and a thick layer of body fat when other apes aren't? Why do we have salt water tear ducts when our primate ancestors don't? The aquatic ape theory accounts for these & many other unexplained physical differences while offering a logical explanation for our increased intelligence erect posture bipedal gait tool making proclivities and vocal dexterity. **Wwe origins** Instead of exploring the empirical validity of these two theories Dartnell avoids mentioning either of them while offering his readers a highly amended version of the largely discredited savanna theory. **Kindle origins** He admits that our bipedal walk evolved before we left our forested habitats but then he claims bipedalism "allowed us to see over tall grass" and minimized the area our bodies were exposed to the hot sun. **Origins tv tropes** After reading Dartnell's account you wonder "hey what happened to the savanna?" The Rift Valley's habitat of large shallow lakes rivers and woods is much compatible with the aquatic ape theory's explanation for hominoid evolution than the old savanna theory. **Origins azeroth quest** Here's two examples:#1) On page 82 he says The first true mammals emerged around 150 million years ago but it was the mass extinction of species 66 million years ago wiping out the dinosaurs that allowed our mammalian ancestors to spread into the niches now left vacant by reptiles. **Book original sin** And Darnell seems to adhere to this antiquated categorization without informing the reader that this is a disputed and inaccurate classification that distorts our understanding of both dinosaurs and genuine reptiles. **Origins spot remover** However the current taxonomical classification system is built around modern animals and is not designed to facilitate extinct animals so there isn't really a clear cut way to classify extinct dinosaurs. **Origins spot gel** For those who wish to examine this in detail see: FactCheck "How Potent Is Methane?" I am currently taking courses on geology. But wait. Reptiles didn't go extinct just dinosaurs did. But so can birds. Both mammals and birds evolved from reptiles. Like birds dinosaurs were warm blooded (endotherms). Reptiles are cold blooded (ectotherms). This is a major difference. Their thigh bones are almost parallel to the ground. They walk & run with a side to side motion. A hole in the hip socket permits this upright stance. Modern birds are the closest living relatives to dinosaurs. They share a common ancestor with non avian dinosaurs. However the reality is actually much confusing than this. When you investigate this issue you find a huge discrepancy. Nevertheless the book is well written and nicely presented. Azeroth Fascinating from beginning to end. And even disturbing was his last chapter Coda. It's almost as though he didn't even read his own book. Other than these quibbles I loved it. Therefore Origins went on my Christmas list. In addition there is no common level of detail. Plate tectonics has always held a fascination for me. More maps would have helped. Azeroth.
